>>>>Specific Programs or Complex Strategies?

No one would argue against the value of research-based interventions. However, as legislators and funding agencies increasingly demand use of empirically supported programs, the issue arises as to whether programs that have met the researchers' criteria are adequate for addressing complex human and social problems in ways that accomplish the most important results. Those who are concerned about demonstrating a program's efficacy and effectiveness tend to deal with complex, multifaceted psychosocial problems from a single program perspective. This leads to cautions from "big picture" thinkers such as Lisbeth Schorr, who has stated that "one truth stands out: the most important results we [schools and communities] are pursuing cannot be achieved by single, narrowly circumscribed interventions."

#### >>NEW DATA ON CHILDREN"S MH PROBLEMS

"Mental Health, United States 2000" (2001) Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's Center for Mental Health Services. Reports that approximately 8.2% of children and adolescents ages 5 - 17 have a psychiatric problem and/or a related significant behavioral impairment. More than 12 percent of these students missed one or more school days in the past 2 weeks. About 30 percent were currently seeing a mental health provider or had received therapy in the past year. 29% of children and adolescents in juvenile justice residential placements have serious emotional disturbance. Comment from a school-based provider:

"...It is very important to understand and make the distinction between treating Mental Health disorders of school aged children and addressing barriers to learning in order to prevent mental disorders and increase the overall functioning of an entire student body...I believe that both school districts and the community need to share in the cost of employing staff capable of implementing universal preventions in schools, brief solution focused interventions and assistance with linking with community agencies for those in need of more extensive interventions. Otherwise, not much will be accomplished. Someone has to share the burden of the costs involved in reforming how schools support and education students..."

A response to the ENEWS issue: "Teacher Turnover: Dropout or Pushout?"

"...It is suspected that as teachers become more stressed and burned out that they interact with their students differently than before. Looking at this from a systems perspective, students react differently in class and toward their teacher than they did before the teacher became stressed and burned out particularly if you view burnout as emotional exhaustion, reduced personal relationships with students, and fewer feelings of personal accomplishment. It becomes cyclic spiraling both students and teachers downward..."

Who Are We?

Under the auspices of the School Mental Health Project in the Department of Psychology at UCLA we established a Center for Mental Health in Schools in 1995. The Project and Center are co-directed by Howard Adelman and Linda Taylor.

Our group at UCLA approaches mental health and psychosocial concerns from the broad perspective of addressing barriers to learning and promoting healthy development. Specific attention is given to policies and strategies that can (a) Counter fragmentation and enhance collaboration between school and community programs and (b) Counter the marginalization of mental health in schools.

We are involved in model development and implementation, training and technical assistance, and policy analysis. Our activities include gathering and disseminating information, materials development, direct assistance, and facilitating networking and exchanges of ideas.
