For various reasons, there continues to be a relentless stream of negative stories about public schools.

We want to help balance the picture conveyed in the media.

To start the process, we worked with UCLA's public relations office to generate a story about the trailblazing work on new directions for student support, featuring the progress in Alabama and Georgia. The office wrote up the story, formatted it as a news release, and sent it out to over 100 news organizations. We have featured the story on our website and facebook and shared it directly with others.
